A Bartlett *Pop Up* event 16-24.07.2017 Sichuan Fine Art Academy, Chongqing, China

The Bartlett Pop up workshop will be hosted by the Sichuan Fine Art Academy and run by the Bartlett School of Architecture.

During the nine days we will be working with a dysfunctional part in the fabric of the city. The ambition is to explore the exisiting potential and propose a series of architectural and urban design interventions into the city to re-soul it. Working through a collective (real) model the ideas and territories have to be negotiated, concepts developed, processes discovered and designs explored.

Chongqing is a feisty expanding city-hub of more than 12m people, 2000km up the Yangtse at the confluence of the JiaLing River. Topographically dynamic, Chongqing sits amongst forested hills and fertile agricultural fringes. Historically Chongqing is an important river-trading city. The city on high ground was encircled by ancient walls, gates, steep steps and wharfs.

Modern central Chongqing is largely rebuilt following the ancient street - and tunnel - patterns, but its major loss is from road severances and disconnections at the rivers' edges. Reconnecting the city to its river is a crucial task supported by all.

The present shape of Chongqing and its architectural and urban landscape has not been the result of a coherent planning process, neither it is shaped by various unplanned actions. It is the result of acts and decisions consciously and deliberately made by a variety of social actors and influenced by local economic, social, geographical and other conditions. As a result the fabric of Chongqing is constantly negotiated. It is the consequence of constant conflict, compromise and conciliation. The challenge for an architect and urban designer is to understand these complex interactions and negotiations and to use them as a basis for a new interaction onto the site.

The goal is to create meaningful urban spaces with tangible and sensible links to the city's past while confidently being part of the present.

How do we negotiate the territories?

How can we co-exist?

How can we shape the future?

Who and what is negotiating?

As a framework for our enquiries, the Pipa Shan / YanZeYan / MaTou site typifies the dysfunctional urban conditions of the city, and - with some 100m height difference - invites radical vertical and horizontal re-connections — re-forming the links between riverbanks and the City. We would like you to engage with the

site/communities/ideas/history/geology/flora and fauna/climate on a conceptual level. We are looking for a carefully produced model combining your individual ideas, challenging your skills and pushing your understanding of architectural interventions and urban design – and most of all negotiating the territory and the ambition of the group for the different sites. The interventions along the route can be small or big, long or high, be permanent or of a transitory nature. But they have to be imaginative.

# TEACHING and OUTCOME

The workshop is intended to attract students of Architecture, Urban Design and related disciplines. We will be looking at a specific site in Chongqing, exploring the potential to reinvigorate the site by introducing specific design ideas. Each student/group of students will have to negotiate the territory, find an appropriate site and explore the ideas through sketches and conceptual models. Following the initial analysis and a rapid iterative process, the final physical model will be part of a bigger site model exploring the interventions on site and demonstrating the negotiations with the programme, site and fellow participants. We will be focussed on designing though making. Following a series of observations on site the process will be translated into a three dimensional model.

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## **Design WARM-UP**

Introductions, PechaKucha presentations from students working methods: presentation from Bartlett tutors.

18th July:

Student working, casual tutorials + Short talk from tutors. Evening walk in CQ.

Student working with casual tutorials and short talk from tutors.

Student working with casual tutorials and short talk from tutors. Design and testing specific interventions

Final presentations with invited critics. Closing remarks. Certificates. Special mentions. Dinner and party!
